

Alabama Scenic River Trail




The Alabama Scenic River Trail is an opportunity for paddlers and powerboaters to wind through more beauty, history and fun—631 miles of it—than on a single trail in any other state. The trail is divided into four regions: the sprawling river lakes of the Piedmont Section begin on the Coosa River at the Georgia State Line and end at Logan Martin Dam. Below the dam begins the Central Section, which continues with the Coosa down to Jordan Dam. The River Heritage Section starts out with Alabama's best full-time whitewater. Then, below the point where the Coosa becomes the Alabama River, it runs through several charming river towns and the state's capital, Montgomery. The Delta Section begins below Claiborne lock and dam and enters naturalist's haven that is the Moblie-Tensaw River Delta before the trail's terminus at Ft. Morgan on the Gulf of Mexico.

The Trail brings to life the history of Alabama that began on the rivers. It brings young and old to the rivers that would ordinarily never have such experiences. It promotes adventure and fun through safe, organized events. It provides a showcase for the state's incredible natural wonders. And it boosts the economy among the communities located along its 631-mile length.

Campsites are established or planned at approximate 10-mile intervals along the Trail for overnight accommodations. Established campgrounds are available in some spots, and there is access to superior lodging—and even shopping—in some places.

The Alabama Scenic River Trail passes through these counties (north to south): Cherokee, Etowah, Calhoun, St. Clair, Talladega, Shelby, Coosa, Chilton, Elmore, Autauga, Montgomery, Lowndes, Dallas, Wilcox, Monroe, Conecuh, Clarke, Baldwin and Mobile.

In 2008, paddler Ardie Olson claimed a \$1,000 prize for completing the Trail in 12 days.
