

Come have fun on beautiful Autauga Creek!



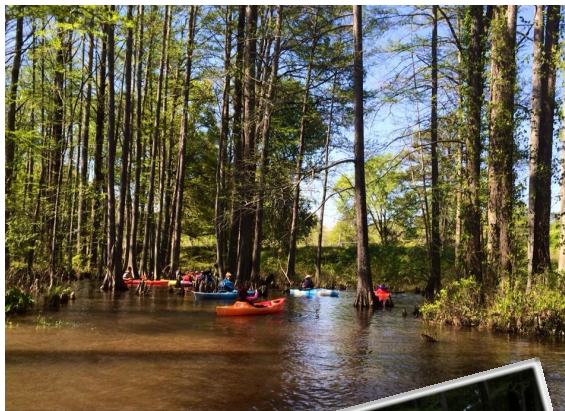
From kayaking or canoeing to toddlers splashing in shallow water, Autauga Creek is fun for all ages.

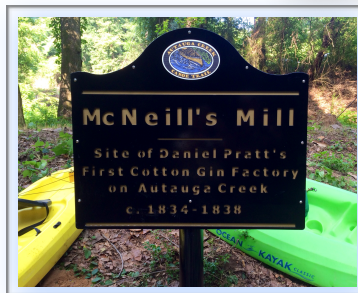
The Canoe Trail (Class I) from the Creekwalk at City Hall to Canoe Trail Park is 4 miles long and takes 2-3 hours. For an easier paddle, check out the upper creek, with cypress swamp and mill pond from the Allenville Road access.

If you want to have a treasure hunt, bring your hand-held GPS and search for one of 35 geocaches hidden along the creek.

You can even float a "lazy river" to the wooden footbridge, then carry your tubes back upstream on the Creekwalk path through Pratt Park.



Pause at the Doster Road artesian well to quench your thirst with cool, refreshing spring water.



Enjoy a picnic at the landscaped Creekwalk, or visit one of the many restaurants just a short walk from the canoe trail. Stroll on the creekside walking path,

and visit the Prattaugan museum to unravel the historic significance of the creek. Browse unique shops and boutiques in Historic Downtown Prattville, and you will have a whole weekend of entertainment.

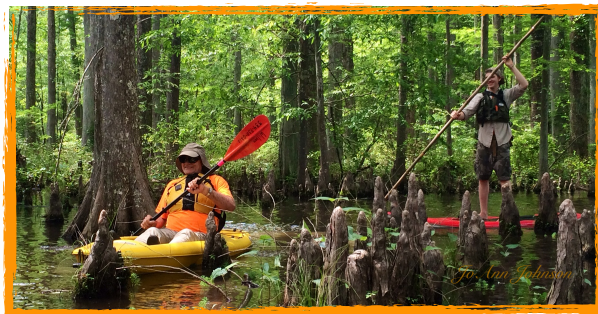
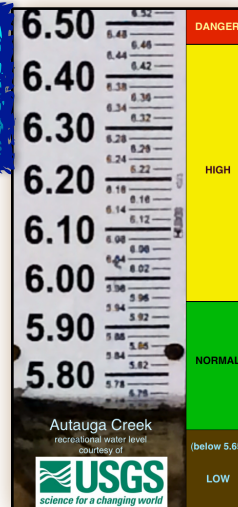

Since the Autauga Creek Improvement Committee was formed in 2011, ACIC volunteers have donated many hours of their time to make our creek a clean, affordable, family-friendly recreational destination. While maintaining the lower creek, they are diligently working to clear obstacles in the upper creek in order to extend the canoe/kayak trail to more than 16 miles.

Several ACIC members also formed a 4-H RiverKids Club, which is open to all youth ages 8-17. Email: riverkids@autaugacreek.org During the spring and summer of 2014, they taught 139 youth to kayak at no cost, in association with the Alabama Scenic River Trail (ASRT), emphasizing safety and stewardship to protect our natural resources.
