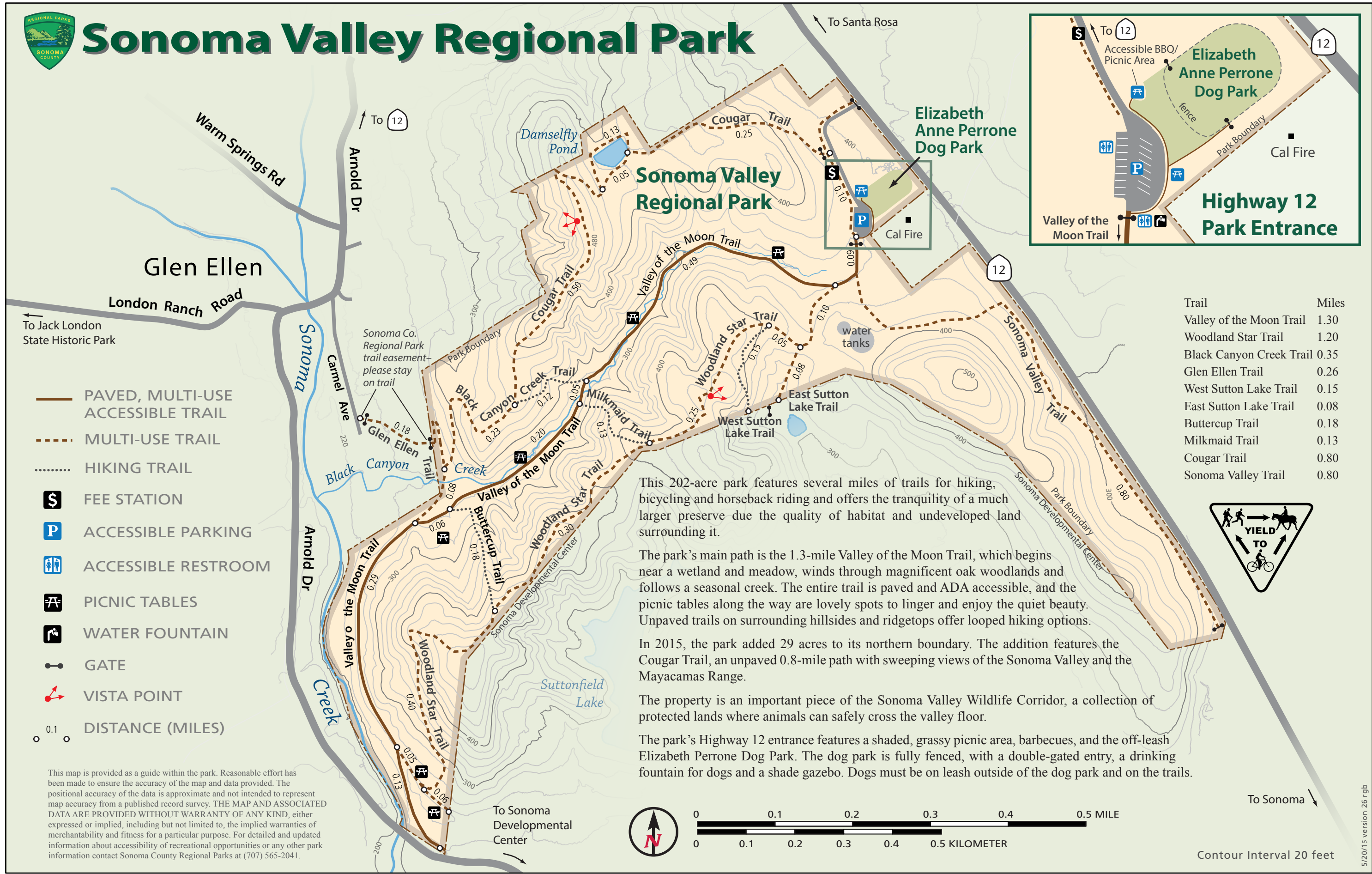




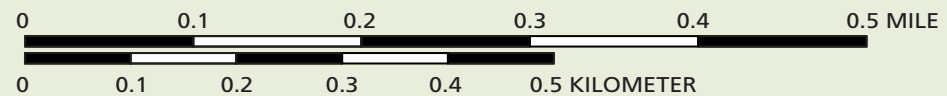
# Sonoma Valley Regional Park

This 202-acre park features several miles of trails for hiking, bicycling and horseback riding and offers the tranquility of a much larger preserve due to the quality of habitat and undeveloped land surrounding it.

The park's main path is the 1.3-mile Valley of the Moon Trail, which begins near a wetland and meadow, winds through magnificent oak woodlands and follows a seasonal creek. The entire trail is paved and ADA accessible, and the picnic tables along the way are lovely spots to linger and enjoy the quiet beauty. Unpaved trails on surrounding hillsides and ridgetops offer looped hiking options.

In 2015, the park added 29 acres to its northern boundary. The addition features the Cougar Trail, an unpaved 0.8-mile path with sweeping views of the Sonoma Valley and the Mayacamas Range.

The property is an important piece of the Sonoma Valley Wildlife Corridor, a collection of protected lands where animals can safely cross the valley floor.

The park's Highway 12 entrance features a shaded, grassy picnic area, barbecues, and the off-leash Elizabeth Perrone Dog Park. The dog park is fully fenced, with a double-gated entry, a drinking fountain for dogs and a shade gazebo. Dogs must be on leash outside of the dog park and on the trails.
